- —Thank you to Herb Krause for serving as our liturgist this morning.
- —Today is **World Communion Sunday**. There are influences from around the world in worship: The cloth on the Table has images from Africa; the chalices are from Jamaica and Haiti. We welcome Nathan Webb and his djembe, a drum from Africa. In the Bambara (Mali) language, 'dje' means gather, and 'be' means peace; so we gather in peace at the sound of the djembe. The first hymn comes from the Native American tradition. The anthem is a setting of a traditional Zulu song, *Siyihamba*. Hymn 509 is an early American (1825) shape-note melody, Holy Manna. It uses only five notes, pentatonic, typical of these sturdy melodies. The Lord's Prayer is spoken in three languages, then all together in English.
- —Communion is served by intinction today. You are invited to come forward, receive a piece of bread (all gluten-free), dip it in the chalice of juice, and partake of it. (Pre-packaged bread and juice are also available.) If you cannot or choose to remain seated, the Communion elements will be brought to you.
- —We receive the Peace & Global Witness Offering today, one of four annual PC(USA) special offerings. The offering enables the PC(USA) to promote peacemaking and reconciliation and address systems that perpetuate violence. FPCOR will retain 25% of the offering for our ministry with the men at the Morgan County Residential Recovery Court. To give, make a check payable to FPCOR and note "Peace" on the memo line, or use the QR code below to give online. Thank you!

Folks of all ages are invited to display their creative works of art, including photography, pottery, weaving, decorative baking, needlework, woodworking, writing, and more.
