

Reading

(Choir) How blest are they whose trespass has freely been forgiven, whose sin is wholly covered before the sight of heaven. Bless them to whom Jehovah will not impute their sin, who has a guileless spirit, whose heart is true within.

(Cantor) While I kept guilty silence my strength was spent with grief, thy hand was heavy upon me, my soul found no relief. But when I owned my trespass, my sin hid not from thee, when I confessed transgression, then thou forgavest me.
